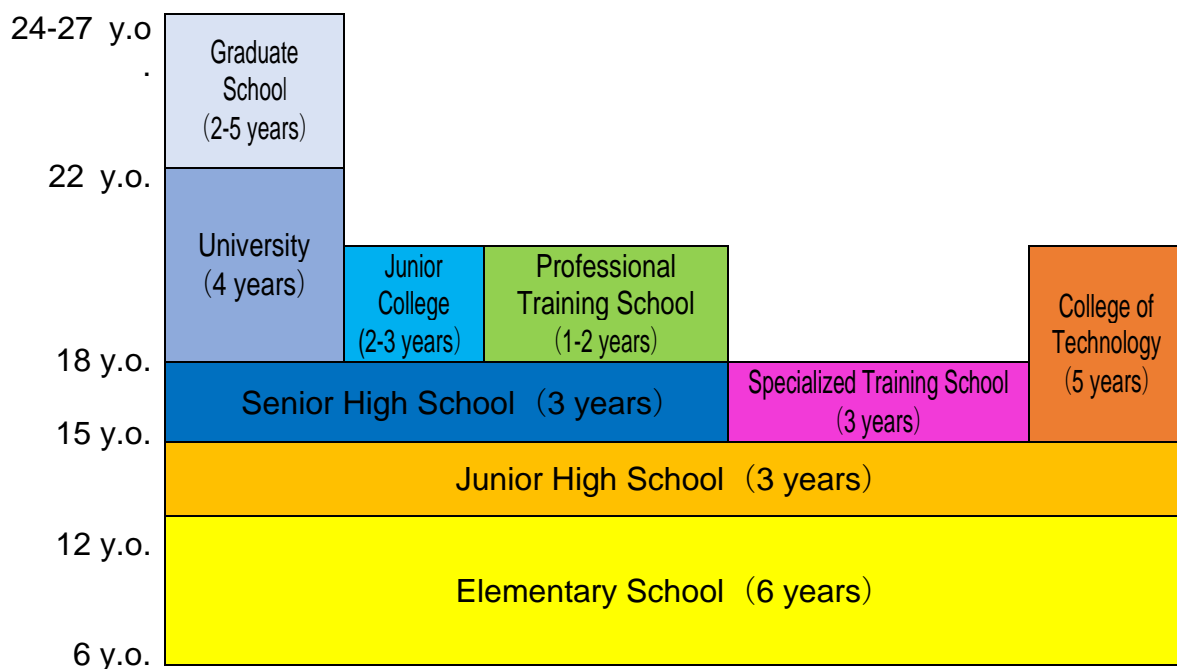
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1. Japanese Educational System

This is a brief explanation of the Japanese educational system.

In Japan, elementary school (6 years) and junior high school (3 years) are compulsory years of education. After graduating from junior high school, about 99% of students go on to attend senior high school (3 years). Furthermore, about 82% of students who graduate from senior high school enroll in university (4 years), junior college (2-3 years) or professional training school (1-2 years).



Why Go to Senior High School?

In Japan, the number of junior high school graduates who immediately start working is very low, that being about 1%. That is because Japanese companies tend to hire not junior high school, but senior high school, university or professional training college graduates.

In addition, many Japanese people think that improving academic ability and acquiring knowledge, culture, and skills are very important. The number of jobs requiring a high school certificate of graduation is also increasing. Therefore, going to senior high school can help you reach your full potential and increase your job options in the future.

2. Senior High Schools (*Koukou*)

There are two kinds of senior high schools: public and private. Most senior high schools conduct classes from Monday to Friday, from around 8:30 AM to 4:00 PM. This is called full-day school system.

In addition to the regular course which is for those who aim at entering university, there are courses in technical subjects aimed at finding employment, as well as an integrated course which allows you to choose classes that suit your interests.

(1) Public Senior High Schools

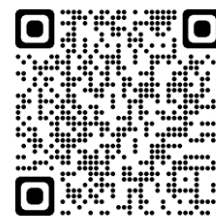
Public senior high schools are administered by their respective city or prefecture. Their lower cost compared to private senior high schools is one of their characteristics. In Aichi prefecture, a new entrance examination system was implemented for those entering senior high school in April 2023. Students can apply to up to two schools as in the past, but there will be just one academic achievement test.

(3) Part-Time Senior High Schools

In part-time senior high schools, there are typically four classes per day. It is possible to work while studying. Although graduating in 4 years is expected, if the student takes additional specified classes, graduating in 3 years is possible, too.

There are daytime and evening courses. From this year, entrance exams will be held only once per year. The following part-time senior high schools are in the vicinity of Toyohashi.

- 【Toyohashi】 Toyohashi Municipal Senior High School (Daytime General Course, Evening General Course/Integrated Business Course)
Aichi Prefectural Toyohashi Koka Senior High School (Evening Mechanical Engineering Course)
- 【Gamagori】 Aichi Prefectural Gamagori Senior High School (Evening General Course)
- 【Kosai, Shizuoka Prefecture】 Shizuoka Prefectural Arai High School (Evening General Course)

(4) Correspondence (*Tsuushinsei*) Senior High Schools

Correspondence High Schools function like universities. You can study at your own pace and earn credits to graduate. You can choose when (day and time) you want to attend, and because of the credit system there is no repeating years, etc. From the 2025 school year, Mito Aoba High School will be included as a public school you can attend. Private schools include NHK Gakuen High School, among others.

(5) Online Applications for Public Senior High Schools

To take an entrance exam for each high school, you will need to apply for the exam (*shutsugan*). Online applications have been available for private high schools for years, and for public high schools since last school year.

A simplified version of the application process is illustrated below (steps for student and parent/guardian are bolded on the left side). Please contact each school directly or visit the Aichi Prefectural Board of Education website for more information.

(6) Private Senior High Schools

When people hear the word “private senior high school,” they usually think that it costs a lot. In Aichi prefecture, however, the government provide parents with tuition fee reduction subsidies and enrollment fee subsidies.

As a result, the tuition fee difference between public and private senior high schools is getting smaller. When transportation expenses are taken into consideration, attending a private senior high school close to your house might cost you less than commuting to a public senior high school far away. Moreover, owing to their special advanced courses and guidance, many private senior high schools have had excellent results in terms of students entering universities and getting jobs at renowned companies.

You will need to prepare around ¥200,000 (enrollment fee) by the beginning of February and around ¥200,000-¥400,000 (school uniform, text books, etc) by the end of March. In total, around ¥400,000-¥600,000 is necessary by the end of March. (The amount may vary from school to school.)

In any case, subsidies can only be received after paying the necessary expense first and completing the procedures. If you are interested in using these systems, please apply through the high school you will enroll in.

3. Other Career Options

(1) Specialized Training School (*Senshuu Gakkou*)

These are schools for people who want to acquire skills and abilities needed for the future profession or daily life. There are domestic science, cooking, designing course.

In Toyohashi city, there is a public school called “Toyohashi-shiritsu Kasei Koto Senshu Gakko”.

- Duration: 3 years
- Certification and license you may acquire: Eligibility to enroll in a university, cook license, certificate to conduct *sado* (Japanese tea ceremony) or *kado* (traditional incense-smelling ceremony) course, food hygiene supervisor, business practical test, etc.

(2) Aichi Prefectural Higashi Mikawa High School of Technology (Aichi-kenritsu Higashimikawa Koto Gijutsu Senmonkou) (*Higashi Mikawa Kou*)

This is a school that nurtures technical workers and conduct professional training. For example, the interior design course is recruiting 30 members who will train for 6 months. The entrance exam subjects are Japanese and mathematics academic achievement tests and interview. If you are interested in entering this school, please inform your homeroom teacher as some required documents must be submitted to the Employment Security Office (*Shokugyou Antei Jo*).

In addition, there is a training school for individuals with disabilities called “*Aichi-ken Shougaisha Shokugyou Nouryoku Kaihatsukou*” (in Toyokawa). It is necessary to submit some documents to the Employment Security Office in order to apply to this school, too.

(3) Finding Employment

For those who wish to work after graduation, please inform your teacher because an “employment consultation” among the student, guardian, homeroom teacher and officer of the Employment Security Office is needed. However, please be aware that the demand for workers who have only completed education through junior high school is very low. In 1995, 242 junior high school graduates were recruited through the Employment Security Office, but not a single person from the Toyohashi/Tahara areas was recruited during the period that ended in March 2024. If you plan to seek employment without completing high school, we recommend you ask your family and friends to introduce you to available jobs.

4. Q&A

Q1: I'm not sure when and what to do because I don't know much about the Japanese entrance examination system. Can you show me the annual academic and career schedule for a third-year junior high school student?

Q2: What is the difference between junior high school and senior high school?

The biggest difference is that junior high school is not compulsory, and unlike junior high school, if you get bad grades or are absent too many days, you may fail and repeat a year or not be able to graduate. Since attending a senior high school is a personal decision to enhance your interest and ability, you have to study seriously or you may not be able to graduate.

Q3: What are the required qualifications to take a senior high school entrance examination?

Those who are over 15 years old and have graduated from a Japanese junior high school or completed elementary school and junior high school (9 years in total) in a foreign country are eligible to take the entrance examination.

Q4: What about textbooks? Where can I buy them?

Textbooks in elementary school and junior high school are provided for free, however that is not the case in senior high school. You need to purchase them under your school's guidance after enrollment. They usually cost ¥20,000-¥30,000.

Q5: What is *naishinten* (school grade score)?

The word *naishinten* actually refers to *chousasho hyoutei*, the sum of school grade scores in the report card graded on a 5-point scale. As the general entrance examination result is decided by the evaluation of the academic achievement test and *chousasho hyoutei* (*naishinten*), grades in the third year of junior high school are very important.

Q6: Are school uniforms and gym clothes specified by school? How much do they cost?

Most senior high schools have their own specified school uniform, gym clothes, and shoes. The price varies from school to school, but school uniforms and gym clothes usually cost around ¥100,000. As the school uniform is purchased when entering school, "enrollment fee+uniform fee+textbook fee" will be necessary.

Some part-time senior high schools' evening courses and correspondence courses don't require school uniforms.

Q7: Is it possible to work while attending school?

There are many people who want to work while studying. With part-time senior high school evening courses, you can work during the day and go to school at night. There are 2 such schools in Toyohashi city: Toyohashi Municipal Senior High School (called “Ichikou”) and Toyohashi Koka Senior High School. In nearby cities, there are Gamagori Senior High School (Gamogori, Ue Honmachi) and Arai Senior High school (Kosai city, Arai-cho), which are part-time senior high schools with evening courses and Mito Aoba Senior High School (Toyokawa city, Mito-cho), a daytime part-time senior high school.

As part-time courses were originally established for student who wish to work while attending school, if you work more than 90 days a year (it can be a part-time job), you can receive financial aid for textbook fees, etc. In addition, a senior high school equivalency diploma can be earned through some correspondence courses (Aichi Prefectural Kariya Higashi Senior High School, Aichi Sangyou Daigaku Mikawa Senior High School, etc.).

Q8: After entering senior high school, I want to start working part-time. Is that okay?

For part-time senior high schools, getting a part-time job is encouraged. However, in full-day senior high schools, you will need your school’s permission to get a part-time job. Please consult your senior high school teacher.

Q9: What is Open School in senior high schools? What should I be aware of?

Open School is when 3rd years are given the opportunity to visit senior high schools and see or experience their classes and club activities. Therefore, if you wonder “What kind of classes do engineering senior high schools have?” or “What can I learn in a commercial senior high school?”, we highly recommend you go visit them.

Open School application forms are distributed at junior high schools. You can submit a completed application to your homeroom teacher, or apply online. You can visit as many schools as you want, but don’t be absent once you have applied. In addition, don’t forget to dress (wear your school uniform) and behave appropriately.

Q10: By when should I decide my future plans?

Please try to decide by October whether you will go on to senior high school or start working. If you will go on to a senior high school, decide your application pattern from A to D at the parent-teacher meeting in December. You will also need to choose the schools to which you will apply at that time.

A: Apply only to private senior high schools.

B: Apply to both public and private senior high schools.

C: Apply only to public senior high schools.

D: Apply to professional training schools or specialized training schools.

Q11: How many subjects will I take for the academic achievement test?

It depends on the school, but in case of public school's general entrance examination, there is going to be 5 subjects: Japanese, Mathematics, Social Studies, Science, and English on the 1st day. The test will be in mark sheet system. On the 2nd day, there is going to be an interview (Some schools don't have interviews). The private school general entrance examination also requires 5 subjects, but for selection by recommendation, there will be Japanese, Mathematics, and English tests, as well as an interview. Some schools require an essay, too. Make sure to ask your junior high school teacher about the entrance examination subjects of the senior high school that you are applying to.

Q12: How are the interviews conducted?

In the interview, senior high school teachers will ask you about your reasons for applying and your school life in junior high school. There is an individual interview and a group interview. Interviews are conducted in Japanese. Teachers pay attention not only to your answers, but also your posture and attitude.

In junior high schools, special practices are provided to help students prepare in advance for the interviews, so please ask your junior high school teacher if you have any questions.

Q13: I heard there is a selection examination for foreign students in Toyohashi Nishi Senior High School and Toyokawa Koka Senior High School. What are they like?

★Selection Examination for Foreign Students

There is a selection examination for foreign students (*Gaikokujin Seito-tou Senbatsu*), where students can have Japanese lessons and course instruction support after enrollment in Aichi Prefectural Toyohashi Nishi Senior High School's integrated course, at Aichi Prefectural Toyokawa Koka Senior High School, or at Aichi Prefectural Mito Aoba High School.

Those who apply must live in Aichi with a guardian, have foreign nationality (or the guardian) and be admitted to Japanese elementary school in the grade 4 or later may apply for the selection examination. Those who are under special circumstances or have lived in Japan for less than 6 years are also qualified for this selection.

The senior high school and course that you apply through this selection must be your 1st choice likewise the selection by recommendation. The academic achievement test consists of basic questions about the subjects (Japanese, mathematics and English) with hiragana *rubi* to aid with reading. It will not be mark sheet system. The interview will be held in Japanese on the same day.

The selection will be based on submitted documents and results of the academic test and interview.

Students who did not pass the selection for foreign students can apply to the same school by taking the general entrance examination.

Q14: I heard part-time school's entrance examination is with *hiragana rubi*. What is it like?

For public high school entrance examinations, there is a special aid where academic tests with *hiragana rubi* and individual interviews (as opposed to group) can be taken.

Applicants must satisfy the following requirements :

(1)Have foreign nationality

(2)Those who are admitted to Japanese elementary school in grade 4 or later, or have lived in Japan for less than six years.

Please ask your junior high school teacher for more details.

Q15: I am interested in computers. Is there a school where I can learn about them?

There are some computer-related professional training/vocational schools with business courses, information courses, etc. Students can learn from the basic usage of business software to information system knowledge and skills. There are some professional training schools that also offer senior high school curriculum.

Other than computers, there are professional training/vocational schools that help people aiming to become cooks, fashion designers, electricians, etc., get licenses that will be useful for them in the future.

Tuition fees for professional training/vocational schools are expensive because they are private schools. In addition to the tuition fee, the material cost for practical training is also necessary. Certain courses ask you to purchase tools such as kitchen knife or scissor set.

School expenses for the first year range from ¥1,000,000 to ¥1,500,000. You must check the total cost until graduation and save money for a long time. There are some subsidy systems so please consult your school teacher to learn more about them.

Q16: What is *Tokushoku Senbatsu* (Specialized Selection)?

This specialized selection will be implemented in a few senior high schools that have specialized courses, an integrated course or a regular course with specialized education or doing community-based educational activities.

An interview is mandatory, and either an essay, general knowledge examination, presentation, or specialized test (practical examination) will also be conducted.

Documents that need to be submitted are: application for admission, school record, and a personal statement. The personal statement must be written by the applicant.

Applying in other ways at the same time, such as selection by recommendation and special selection for foreign students, is not allowed.

In the Higashi Mikawa district, this selection will be implemented in the following senior high schools. For those interested, please consult your school teacher.

5. Personal Experience

I was 5th grader in elementary school when I first came to Japan. I was very worried because I didn't know any Japanese language and culture at that time. Despite the hardship, I learned Japanese and got used to school life. After a year, I had to go back to my home country due to family reasons. After attending elementary and junior high school there, I came back to Japan again in January when I was a 2nd grader in junior high school.

Although I could understand a little Japanese as it was my second time in Japan, I could barely keep up with the studies. I had some friends, but I had no idea when it came to senior high schools or career issues. I felt alone every day because my family didn't know about the Japanese school system either. That was the time when my homeroom teacher and *kokusai* (International) teacher talked to me.

They invited an interpreter and I told her that I was lost and didn't know what to do. After that, they were so kind and told me about my situation at that time. They suggested I attend the "Career Information Session for Foreign Students" held by the city hall and also explained things to my parents at the parent-teacher meeting. Then, with the help of others, I studied very hard in order to pass the entrance examination for senior high school.

I successfully passed the entrance examination and joined the English club. I chose this club because I want to live by myself and work in a hotel with many foreign guests in the future. I am currently studying hard every day to challenge myself with various qualification tests, such as *Eiken* (English Proficiency Test), so that I can get closer to fulfilling my dream.

What I want to tell you all is that, "Where there is a will, there is a way". Even if your family members don't know much about Japan, there is definitely someone who can help you. Even if you are not good at speaking Japanese, don't be afraid to ask your friends and teachers. I am sure that you will get some clues from them. I am still on my way to fulfilling my dreams. Let's strive together!

6. The Most Important Thing

It was in 1990 when a foreign student entered Japanese school in Toyohashi for the first time. Now, more than 2,000 foreign students study in elementary schools and junior high schools, and a lot of them continue their study for their future in Japan. Some of them receive college degrees, and become teachers or work in city hall. On the other hand, it is also a fact that others lose their will to study and quit school because of the differences in language, culture, and habits.

The Japanese school system is undoubtedly different from that of your home country, so it may be confusing even for parents who have lived in Japan for a long time. As for parents who have just arrived in Japan, the worries and doubts must be a lot. However, regardless of the situation, **education, which forms the basis of your child's life, is very important.**

In Japan, education until the age of 15 is mandatory, so no one is allowed to quit school or work. That is because education until the age of 15 is thought to be necessary. In order to go to a Japanese senior high school, a junior high school graduation certificate either from Japan or your home country is needed.

We sometimes meet people who say "I want to go to school again" a few years after having quit junior high school. But it is very hard to do so without graduating from junior high school in Japan or your home country.

Parents, please don't let your child quit school easily. If you have any issue, please consult the school or the Board of Education. Let's find a solution together.
